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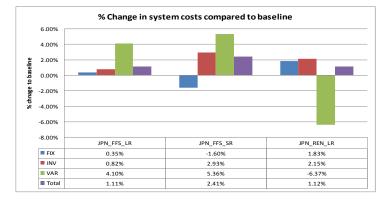
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Climate Change Policy: as a moral issue

- Responsibility: Japan has a lot as a developed country
- Comparability: Japan's efforts level is most likely in the middle among developed countries
- It is necessary to discuss seriously the "principles" for the serious climate change mitigation action

Climate Change Policy: as an economic/industrial policy

- Renewable is cheaper than the fossil fuel
- Renewable and energy



Results of the TIMES Japan model analysis by IGES

- conservation is the single most prospective industry in the 21st century.
- "Loss of international competitiveness and hollowing-out" is just a myth

Climate Change Policy: as a diplomatic policy

- Japan is being viewed as one of the "Gang of four"
- Japan's multilateralism seems to have faded away
- However, Japan can become a dealmaker in the negotiation for post 2012 (Hayama proposal)

Climate Change Policy: The Way forward

- FIT is not enough
- Carbon pricing is necessary and inevitable
- Destruction of various myths, quantitative analysis and easy-tounderstand messages to general public and policy makers are key
